INTRODUCTION

This Fiscal Years 2011 and 2012 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) of the Miami-Dade Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) describes transportation planning activities to be managed by the MPO in and for Miami-Dade County, Florida. Tasks included in this document are scheduled to be completed during the fiscal period beginning July 1, 2010 and ending on June 30, 2012 as indicated by their respective funding sources. The document outlines the planning projects budget and activities that will support the comprehensive and multimodal transportation improvement program approved for the metropolitan area in the adopted Year 2035 Miami-Dade Long Range Transportation Plan Update (LRTP). The LRTP was adopted by the Governing Board on October 29, 2009 after numerous official and public review activities were conducted throughout the metropolitan area. The LRTP addresses the multimodal transportation system needs for the period 2010-2035.

The work outlined in this UPWP is to be undertaken in a cooperative manner between the various participating Miami-Dade County Departments, regional agencies and the Florida Department of Transportation. This work is guided by policies adhered to by the State of Florida and the Metropolitan Planning Organization Governing Board. Guidance from the Federal transportation agencies that support the program is also used as a significant element in the definition of planning projects. "At a minimum, a UPWP includes a description of the planning work and resulting products, who will perform the work, time frames for completing the work, the cost of the work, and the source(s) of funds." (23 C.F.R. 450.308)

The MPO was created under Section 163.01, Chapter 163, Florida Statutes and established by Interlocal Agreement between Miami-Dade County and the Florida Department of Transportation on March 2nd, 1977 under Title XXVI, Chapter F.S. 339.175. The MPO Governing Board is composed of twenty-three (23) voting members charged with making transportation planning decisions in the Urbanized Area with the assistance of technical recommendations and citizen comments. The Governing Board includes the thirteen (13) Miami-Dade County Commissioners. The Governor of Florida appoints an elected municipal official to represent municipal interests, a citizen who does not hold elective office and resides in the unincorporated area of Miami-Dade County, a member of the Miami-Dade Expressway Authority and a member of the Miami-Dade County School Board. During the 1999 legislative session, the Florida Legislature revised Florida Statutes to permit an elected official from each city with over fifty thousand (50,000) residents in Miami-Dade County to serve on the Governing Board. These six cities include: Hialeah, Homestead, Miami, Miami Beach, Miami Gardens and North Miami. The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has two nonvoting representatives on the MPO Board. Membership of the Miami-Dade County MPO is constituted under the Chartered County option allowed by the State Statutes.

A major role of the MPO is to ensure conformance with federal regulations requiring that highways, mass transit and other transportation facilities and services are properly developed and deployed in relation to the overall plan of urban development and to approve plans for regional and state transportation network accessibility. In addition, federal guidelines require that the use of Federal Aid for transportation be consistent with MPO endorsed plans and programs.

FDOT uses the MPO's Long-Range Transportation Plan as the guide plan for implementing state transportation system improvements in Miami-Dade County. Federal, state and local transportation planning funds are provided on an ongoing basis to ensure the effectiveness of the MPO process. The MPO Board meets monthly in the Miami-Dade County Commission Chambers. All meetings of the Governing Board are open to the public. In performing its major functions, the MPO:

- o Develops a Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) for the urban area that specifies transportation improvements over at least a twenty-year horizon.
- Compiles an annually updated Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The TIP lists projects selected from the adopted Transportation Plan to be implemented during a five-year cycle.
- Prepares this Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) which outlines the planning projects that will assist in further defining the comprehensive and multimodal transportation plans for the area.
- Maintains a Citizens' Transportation Advisory Committee (CTAC) to provide a broad crosssection of citizen perspectives in the planning and development of the urban transportation system. Minorities, the elderly, and persons with disabilities are appropriately represented on this committee.
- O Coordinates the activities of the Transportation Planning Council (TPC). The TPC advises the MPO governing Board on technical matters. The TPC includes directors of County Departments participating in the transportation planning process as listed on the first page of this document. The TPC is supported by the Transportation Planning Technical Advisory Committee (TPTAC) by providing technical support. TPTAC discussions are focused on technical aspects related to the projects. This committee is composed of representatives of the entities that have TPC voting members and are appointed by the director of each entity.
- Assesses visual impacts of transportation projects through the Transportation Aesthetics Review Committee (TARC). The TARC reviews high visibility transportation projects to assure that aesthetic considerations are an integral and early part of the planning, design and construction process.
- Facilitates public involvement at all levels of the MPO process. Transportation issues are submitted routinely to the CTAC for review and plans are available for public comment prior to their adoption.
- Maintains a bicycle/pedestrian program to ensure that transportation plans provide for the use of non-motorized alternatives recommended by the Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC).
- Ensures that access to transportation is provided to disadvantaged persons. The Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board monitors opportunities for children at-risk, the elderly, the poor, and the disabled.

The level of effort represented by this UPWP is based upon several objectives, the most important of which is the need to address transportation related issues in the metropolitan area. The 2035 LRTP lays out the current adopted principals for transportation planning in South Florida. The overriding policy is to develop a transportation system that optimizes the movement of people and goods while reinforcing the fundamentals of sustainability, equitability and environmental compatibility. These planning elements must also implement the transportation priorities found in the County Comprehensive Development Master Plan (CDMP) to:

- o Stress connectivity and continuity among all elements and components of the system,
- o Promote effectiveness and efficiency in system plans, programs and projects and
- o Increase travel choices throughout the County.

Based upon these adopted priorities the 2035 goals for transportation planning are:

- o Improve transportation systems and travel
- o Increase the Safety of the Transportation System for Motorized and Non-motorized Users
- o Increase the Security of the Transportation System for Motorized and Non-motorized Users
- o Support Economic Vitality
- o Protect and Preserve the Environment and Quality of Life and Promote Energy Conservation

- Enhance the Integration and Connectivity of the Transportation System, Across and Between Modes, for People and Freight
- o Optimize Sound Investment Strategies for System Improvement and Management/Operation
- o Maximize and Preserve the Existing Transportation System

These objectives are in turn based on the policies defined in the LRTP and in the Miami-Dade Comprehensive Development Master Plan and are consistent with the transportation goals expressed in the Strategic Regional Policy Plan for South Florida. The program is also consistent with local comprehensive plans adopted by each of the thirty-five municipalities in the county.

In addition, projects in the Fiscal Years 2011 and 2012 UPWP address required work activities and agreed upon issues and priorities. These include but are not limited to: Safe, Accountable, Flexible & Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) planning factors (pages E-29 and E-30), improvements outlined in the 2035 Long Range Transportation Plan, public transportation and ride sharing, Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS), transportation program funding issues and air quality considerations. The FYs 2011 and 2012 UPWP also includes the Municipal Grant Program whereby municipalities are granted funds to prepare relevant transportation planning studies. Additional efforts will continue during FYs 2011 and 2012 to address regional concerns to include, but not limited to, promoting seamless system connectivity, freight and goods movement and Efficient Transportation Decision-Making (ETDM).

The public sector is solicited to submit ideas to be considered for inclusion in the UPWP. A "Call for Ideas" brochure is sent out to all parties listed on the MPO Database. This list includes, but is not limited to, every citizen that has communicated with the MPO and provided contact information. In addition, the brochure is placed on the MPO web site and presented to the CTAC, TARC, BPAC and FTAC. Also, the winter quarterly newsletter mentions the UPWP and how to get involved. Reference task 4.14 of this document for more details on the public information program.

ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

In the performance of these duties, the MPO is assisted by professional staff from Local and State transportation agencies. Other entities such as the South Florida Regional Planning Council, the South Florida Regional Transportation Authority, the Miami-Dade County Expressway Authority, FDOT District Six, Florida's Turnpike Enterprise and the Broward and Palm Beach Counties' MPOs, work closely with the Miami-Dade County MPO to achieve coordination in regional transportation planning.

The Director of the MPO Secretariat is designated by, and serves at the pleasure of the County Manager. The Secretariat staff coordinates the activities of the component structure comprising the MPO; prepares the meeting agendas for the Governing Board and the Transportation Planning Council (TPC); prepares resolutions, agreements and other documents; schedules and gives notice of meetings; records and keeps minutes; develops operating procedures for conduct of the Secretariat function; coordinates the implementation of policies established by the Governing Board as reflected in the transportation planning program, and performs other administrative and technical duties as may be assigned by the County Manager.

The Director of the MPO Secretariat acts as the overall Program Administrator and Manager. Technical management control over each project in the transportation planning program is exercised by the Project Manager to whom the task is assigned. Ultimate review of program work products rests with the TPC and its Task Forces and Committees. Planning tasks herein are to be performed with funds under Titles 23 and 49 USC.

Agreements are reviewed yearly as part of the certification process and updated as needed. Also, the Rules of the MPO Governing Internal Organization which details the Board Composition, Appointments, establishes Quorum, Rules of Debate, etc. are available under Appendix D of the MPO Prospectus. Additional detailed information concerning the MPO planning process and standard MPO agreements are outlined in the Adopted MPO Prospectus in the Appendix section titled "Interlocal Agreement", "First Amendment to Interlocal Agreement", "Urban Transportation Planning Agreement" and the F.S. 339.175 and F.S. 339.176 pertaining to the MPO Provisions. For more details, a copy of the Prospectus may be obtained by calling (305) 375-4507, or requesting by e-mail: mpo@miamidade.gov and is also available on the MPO web site. Required forms, certifications, assurances, matrices and tables are included in this document under Appendix E.

Formal technical guidance is provided by the Transportation Planning Council (TPC) of the MPO and the Transportation Planning Technical Advisory Committee (TPTAC). Citizen participation is ensured through the monthly meetings of the Citizens' Transportation Advisory Committee (CTAC) and the Transportation Aesthetics Review Committee (TARC) with hearings held throughout the community during the program period as necessary under task 4.05; Citizen Transportation Committees. The public involvement process is also complemented through task 4.14; Public Information Program. In addition, there are two other committees whose input is incorporated in the transportation planning process as appropriate; the Bicycle Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) under task 3.04 and the Freight Transportation Advisory Committee (FTAC) under task 2.01.

PURPOSE:

This usually involves selective adjustments or corrections to the current year and projection datasets in order to improve forecasting results. This is an ongoing task.
- Continue the process of keeping the principal Florida Standard Urban Transportation Model Structure (FSUTMS) variables, chiefly population, housing and employment, current for use in special transportation projects. This is an ongoing task.
- Continue the creation and maintenance of a database that will incorporate land use, property information and employment. This could be used to analyze different development scenarios. Planning and Zoning's Land Use Allocation Model (LUAM) application will be used in conjunction with Property Appraiser's files, and population estimates in order to generate the initial data for this comprehensive database.
- Finalize newly delineated Traffic Analysis Zones (TAZ) for the 2010 Census Transportation Planning process. This requires interaction with the process of delineating census tracts and blocks for the U.S. Census. In consultation with MPO staff and using the characteristics identified by the Census staff will continue the process, using GIS and Census files to identify those TAZs that should be modified and areas where new TAZs should be created.
- Continue Real Time Date Data (RTDD), to track focal points of redevelopment construction activity within the Urban Development Boundary (UDB). RTDD is a Geographic Information System (GIS) layer that displays parcels that have recent impact fee payments by specific type. As such it anticipates sites of imminent construction activity, often months before site preparation. Maintain a folio specific database that is mapped by TAZ for the purpose of characterizing recent construction by TAZ and to map their relationship with the various transportation corridors with our GIS capabilities.
- Assist MPO staff, FDOT local administration and their consultants with selected GIS products and research.
- Prepare for the update of the Lifestyle variables and the incorporation of ACS data as released.

PREVIOUS WORK:

- Updated population, housing, and employment by TAZ.
- Initial proposed TAZs for 2010 coordinated with census tract geography.
- Assisted MPO staff with selected map products and information services. (Ongoing)

ELEMENT A: LONG-RANGE TRANSPORTATION PLANNING FOR SYSTEM PRESERVATION, DEVELOPMENT AND ENHANCEMENT

METHODOLOGY:

- Department staff members have successfully applied the same methodology for several decades of database development: Efforts that extended across several generations of transportation models. The process begins with population and housing estimates and forecasts by Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) sub area, used as control totals for distribution to the TAZ level after referencing land use, zoning, infrastructure availability, and growth trends. With these TAZ base figures in place, the Lifestyle Variables can be derived by applying interpolations and projections of census parameters and factors with Statistical Analysis System (SAS) routines.
- Using the County's administrative records database as input, with the application of GIS technology, derive estimate of housing units (by SF, MF type) and population for TAZ geography and data from the American Community Survey.
- Following the guidelines and report structure developed by Cambridge Systematics, and US Census software with GIS technology, identify, map and identify TAZ's for 2010. This procedure is carried out in parallel with census tract delineation for the 2010 Census, in order that the new TAZ's nest precisely within the 2010 tracts.
- New GIS technology has created new opportunities and possibilities to bring data from different sources, land-use, property appraiser and other employment sources, to create an integrated database.

3.01 AIR QUALITY CONFORMITY DETERMINATION ASSESSMENT

PURPOSE:

- Coordinate with the local air agency, the transit operator and FDOT District Six Office to ensure the planning and programming consultation among the three counties effectively address air quality issues. Also to ensure the appropriate contingency actions are taken and implemented if, once under maintenance status there is an air quality exceedance or any violations.
- On January 6, 2010 US Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) announced their proposal to strengthen the national ambient air quality standards for ground level ozone. The proposed range for the ozone standard is from .060 parts per million to .070 parts per million. The USEPA will take public comment for 60 days following publication of the proposal in the Federal Register. USEPA will make a final announcement by August 31, 2010. The schedule for implementation is as follows:
 - o **By January 2011:** States make recommendations for areas to be designated attainment, nonattainment or unclassifiable.
 - o By July 2011: USEPA makes final area designations.
 - o August 2011: Designations become effective.
- SAFETEA-LU was approved August, 2005 and has been recently extended until a new transportation bill is approved. To the extent feasible within this UPWP, address any new federal requirement related a newly adopted Transportation Bill superseding SAFETEA-LU and to any Climate Change/Global Warming and/or Sustainability federal requirements that may arise.

PREVIOUS WORK:

 MPO staff participated in the monthly meetings of the Southeast Air Coalition for Outreach (SEACO) and their events such as "Clean Air Month" and "Southeast Florida Bike Month".

METHODOLOGY:

- The whole state of Florida is in full attainment for ozone and all air quality conformity requirements as of June 15, 2005. As a result, this task is maintaining a minimum effort as correlated with the new funding level. MOVES is currently the approved USEPA model to assess emissions but there will be a two year phase in period where either Mobile6 or MOVES could be used. If there is a need to perform an air quality conformity determination we stand ready to use either Mobile6 or MOVES.
- Coordinate with FHWA Florida Division and the US Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) any potential conformity determination requirements due to ongoing discussions by EPA on more strict ozone standards which may trigger areas to be redesignated to non-attainment and thus requiring a new cycle of air quality conformity determination requirements.
- Regional Coordination: Participate in and host (on a rotating basis) meetings of the SE Florida Inter-MPO Air Quality Committee and the Southeast Air Coalition for Outreach (SEACO) meetings.

CURRENT STUDIES:

Continued from FY 2010:

• Economic Impact Analysis for Freight Industry in Miami-Dade County – This study will track the magnitude of goods moving from the source to market, the amount of warehousing real estate in Miami, the number of jobs involved at the airport, the seaport, in warehousing, rock mining, rail transport, and trucking. These jobs have secondary impacts in vehicle sales, real estate, fuel, material, permits, licenses, maintenance, and taxes. This study will document the primary and secondary impacts of the freight industry then apply economic multipliers to determine the full impact on the economy of South Florida.

METHODOLOGY:

The MPO Secretariat has an existing open contract with five (5) consulting firms to assist staff in conducting transportation planning related activities. These services are on an as-needed basis. A new three-year contract was executed in August 2009.

Type of Services

The consultant will be required to perform any one or more of the following activities:

- Data collection regarding traffic and transit information, such as: traffic counts, accident records, surveys, passenger counts, vehicle delays, etc.
- Update and analyze existing transportation data to determine transportation needs including, but not limited to travel demand and air quality modeling, level of services (LOS) and future travel projections.
- Preparation of maps, presentations and reports using state-of-the-art techniques, including but not be limited to Geographic Information System (GIS), 3-D effects and any other visual tools available in the market.
- Any other miscellaneous activities that may be needed to support the MPO Secretariat's Transportation Planning Process.
- Studies awarded through the "Call for Ideas" solicitation process during FY 2012.

Process

A written work order will be prepared and proposals will be requested from the five firms already contracted for this program for each task. The proposals shall include experience of the firm in conducting the requested study, personnel to be assigned to the study, approach to the study, estimated cost and projected time schedule for completing the requested study. Scope of services will be forwarded to FDOT for 3rd party approval prior to issuing the Notice to Proceed (NTP) letter. The MPO will evaluate the proposals and assign the work order to one of the firms. An NTP letter authorizing the work order will be issued to the consultant to start the work. The consultant will submit monthly invoices as appropriate. A written progress report should accompany these invoices for payment.

Continued participation on the Planning and Technical Advisory Committee (PTAC) and the Technical committees of each MPO in the region.

Continued working on a Regional Hurricane Evacuation Model Development with participation from FDOT Districts Four and Six, Division of Emergency Management (DEM), Florida Department of Community Affairs (DCA), and Broward, Miami-Dade and Monroe Counties.

Continued to serve on the Regional Transportation Technical Advisory Committee's (RTTAC) for the Regional Long Range Transportation Plan Development.

Continued to participate on the Climate Change Committee for Miami-Dade County Department of Environmental Management (DERM) as it pertains to strategic greenhouse gas reduction planning.

Continued to participate in the development of integrated land use and transportation planning activities including State Road 7/U.S. 441 Collaborative and supporting educational opportunities for elected officials throughout the region.

Continued to facilitate the Gold Coast Cities Program.

4.04 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

PURPOSE:



- Maintain a formal and current 5-Year Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) consistent with long-range planning activities and with statutory requirements. The TIP is the staged, intermodal program of transportation improvement projects for the metropolitan planning area developed pursuant to 23CFR part 450, and consistent with the requirements established in Title 23 USC 134(h) and Section 339.175 of the Florida statutes.
- **Maintain an interactive web-based application** to foster public involvement and provide 24-hour access to TIP information. Transition to Google-map-based interactive application.

PREVIOUS WORK:

- This is a continuing work element of the metropolitan transportation planning process. Yearly cycle usually begins sometime during the month of June of a given year and extends through June of following year.
- Annual Obligation listings for fiscal years 2009-2013 and 2010-2014.
- Fiscal Years 2010-2014 and 2011-2015 TIP.

METHODOLOGY:

- Maintain the permanent Standing Committee for TIP Development and Review as a vehicle to facilitate a continuous and accurate involvement of the TIP document as the cycle progresses.
- Coordinate the preparation and prepare 5-year proposals for capital expenditures for all transportation modes. Coordinate input from all participating agencies. Coordinate with the Miami-Dade County Office of Management and Budget the review of capital budgets from county agencies to ensure conformity with the TIP and the Capital Improvement Element (CIE) of the Comprehensive Development Master Plan with the County's Annual Capital Budget and Multi-Year Capital Plan. Consider the requirements of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible and Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU).
- Criteria used for ranking projects in the TIP are as follows:
 - o Highway: criteria used to prioritize highway projects is divided into subcategories:
 - Roadway widening: this category represents conventional roadyway widening projects which could be analyzed through a before/after comparison of travel demand model simulations. The formula is patterned after the ranking method used in the LRTP process (LOS gain divided by cost per mile).
 - New Roadway extensions: roadway extension projects add "new" capacity to the transportation system and therefore are difficult to compare to "before" scenario. For pusposes of determining the relative value of new roadway extensions, the relief to parallel facilities will be one of the variables focused on.
 - Roadway reconstruction: although many roadway reconstruction projects may not be considered as truly capacity-enhancing, the nature of some (i.e., widening existing lane widths

from 10 to 12 ft) do reduce side friction and increase travel speeds and, therefore, capacity to a lesser extent.

- o Transit: criteria used to prioritize transit projects is divided into subcategories, as follows:
 - Fixed guideway rail extension: such a project would assume direct connection to the existing Metrorail alignment. Determination based upon direct comparison to other projects in the a cost effectiveness matrix.
 - New busway facility: such a project would assume direct connection to the existing Metrorail
 - New Bus route or area transit service: recommendations for new bus routes or new area transit services would stem from studies conducted under the umbrella of the UPWP.
- o Bicycle: projects are to be transportation facilities, not recreational. Prioritization of bicycle projects places emphasis on those locations with large numbers of "captive captive" users. These factors include: high population densities; low median income; low automobile ownership; high levels of blue collar employment; low median age; low level of transit availability. Preference also given to those projects filling the gaps in the bikeways system or contribute to unified network of facilities.
- o Pedestrian: selection of candidate pedestrian projects relies heavily on a system of municipal or neighborhood support. Preference given to projects that complete pedestrian networks or fill in the gaps (provide access to schools, hospitals and parks) or that significantly improve and promote pedestrian accessibility (such as an overpass over a busy highway or a canal); improve accessibility of pedestrian networks for the transportation disadvantaged (or that bring existing pedestrian systems into compliance with federal or state regulations such as ADA).
- Review scope of projects, priorities and schedules. This work is usually carried out between the months of June and November of a given yearly cycle. Prepare the "MPO Program Transportation Priorities" to be submitted to FDOT on October 1, 2010.
- Assist FDOT with ongoing Efficient Transportation Decision Making (ETDM) efforts.
- Coordinate Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) development with long-range plan and its programmatic goals. Priority consideration to roadway segments identified as operating below acceptable level of service standards.
- Maintain ongoing activities to monitor and report on progress and status of programmed projects.
- Prepare document for MPO Committees, and Board review and approval.
- Seek endorsement of TIP document by all MPO Committees by May 2011.
- Upload and maintain the Interactive TIP application at the Miami-Dade County's web portal and MPO's website. Upkeep Geographic Information Systems (GIS) shape files, TIP database, multimedia and data entry interface requirements for agencies to be able to populate database.
- The update of the InteracTIP is an ongoing effort. It becomes labor intensive from December to May, while a new TIP is developed. It reflects monthly TIP amendments, the update of the Citizens TIP document and the multimedia that groups all end products. Also, it involves the updating of all GIS shape files, project pictures, project manager information and project advancement description.
- To compile and publish the Annual Obligation Listing, which is a listing of projects for which Federal Funds have been obligated in the preceding fiscal year. This documentation is coordinated with the District Six Office and produced yearly and made available to the public in both paper and electronic format.

PURPOSE:



Provide the Citizens Transportation Advisory Committee (CTAC) and **community with information regarding transportation** needs and proposals for meeting these needs. **Ensure citizen and community input** in all aspects of multi-modal transportation planning and decision-making process before plans and programs are approved. **Ensure architectural and aesthetic review** of major bridges and transportation projects, via the Transportation Aesthetics Review Committee (TARC). There are two other Citizen Transportation Committees, FTAC and BPAC, which are listed under tasks 2.01 and 3.04, respectively. They are not listed in this task since their scope is specific to a mode of transportation and does not cover all transportation issues like CTAC and TARC.

PREVIOUS WORK:

This element is a continuing activity.

The following activities occurred for CTAC from 2008 - 2010:

- Held 24 Subcommittees and 21 full Committee meetings.
- A total of 26 Resolutions were adopted and those resolutions were distributed to the appropriate agencies for consideration and action.
- Ten appointments were made.
- Full Committee meetings that were held in the County Commission Chambers were televised.



- Purchase TV (\$1,000) to make presentations in conference room.

- Provide requested information to auditors performing the single audit.

4.12 AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) REQUIRED INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS

PURPOSE:

To bring County infrastructure into ADA compliance, by removing pedestrian barriers to allow access to public facilities. This is a continuing activity.

PREVIOUS WORK:

- Service Request(s) (SR) from citizens are researched and surveyed to provide accessible sidewalks through the ADA Hot Line Service (approximately 100 per year). This service has been re-routed to the County's 311 line.
- Public Works Department (PWD) continues to survey existing infrastructure to determine locations where improvements are needed. These improvements are in the category of sidewalks, curb-cuts, median-cuts, pedestrian ramps and Detectable Warning Surfaces (DWS).

METHODOLOGY:

- Continue identifying architectural barriers to determine where improvements are necessary within County maintained roadways, and services such as Miami-Dade Transit, Parks and other programs.
- Develop cost estimates for needed sidewalks and ramps improvements, seek funding sources, and prepare work orders for its construction, in accordance with ADA adopted guidelines.

Prioritized construction work orders for infrastructure sidewalks and pedestrian ramp improvements to county maintained roadways for compliance with ADA compliance. (June 2011 and June 2012)

4.13 MUNICIPAL GRANT PROGRAM

PURPOSE:



Encourage Miami-Dade County municipalities to participate in a competitive program for the performance of relevant **transportation planning studies**.

PREVIOUS WORK:

- Four cities were awarded funding during the FY 2010 program and as follows: Hialeah Transit System Express Transit Service Feasibility Study, Doral 2005 Transportation Master Plan Update, Palmetto Bay Safe Routes to School Study, and the Medley NW 116th Way Corridor Study. All four cities are anticipated to be completed by the end of FY 2010.
- Municipal Grant Program Committee reviewed proposals and made award recommendations to the MPO Board to fund the municipalities under the FY 2011 program as listed in the Methodology and itemized in the End Products.

METHODOLOGY:

- To plan for transportation improvements stressing community-based methods and cost-effective solutions.
- Progress reports required before any reimbursements can be approved.
- A formal presentation of the end-product and findings of the study before CTAC, TPTAC and the TPC.
- Continued work on the Cities awarded in FY 2010, should delays occur.
- The following award recommendations were made by the Municipal Grant Program (MGP) Selection Committee for work to be conducted during the 2011 program:
 - O City of Miami Health District Bicycle and Pedestrian Mobility Study \$48,000 To obtain data/recommendations needed in order to apply for grants for pedestrian and bicycle improvements throughout the district. To encourage private mixed-use development that is pedestrian/bicycle/transit-friendly. Provide safe and convenient linkages to adjoining neighborhoods through implementation of a continuous pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure network. To maximize transit usage and encourage multimodal transportation in the area by enhancing pedestrian and bicycle facilities.
 - O Village of Pinecrest Safe Routes to School \$40,000 To prepare a Safe Routes to School plan for its four schools that have identified the need for a safe route within the school attendance boundary. Also, to prepare the FDOT Safe Routes to School Infrastructure Funding Applications for each school, for particular items that are not within Village jurisdiction.
 - O City of Miami Springs Traffic Circulation and Parking Study for Westward Drive \$16,000 To update traffic circulation and parking studies from 2001 and 2002 in support of City initiatives currently in progress for revitalization and renewal of its downtown commercial core. This study will target the present conditions of serious vehicular, pedestrian and bicycle collision exposure issues of a traffic pattern that has

been largely unchanged for the past 80 years. The update will interface with a recent Miami-Dade County study and report on the adjacent Curtiss Circle/Curtiss Parkway area, and provide up-to-date traffic and parking data, analyze deficiencies, and identify and evaluate potential operational improvements to address problems of this major arterial roadway.

- O Town of Cutler Bay Town-wide Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan \$40,000 To create a vision for non-motorized transportation within the Town boundaries which will develop projects or policies that can accomplish that vision, and to develop performance measures. Additionally, the report developed will serve as the non-motorized component of the Town's Transportation Element to the Comprehensive Plan. The financially feasible project will become a component of the Town's 5-Year Capital Improvement Element of the Comprehensive Plan.
- O Town of Surfside Pedestrian and Bicycle Network Study \$24,665 Identify opportunities to; develop an interconnected system of bicycle and pedestrian facilities, provide connectivity between parks and recreational facilities, natural amenities and the Town's business district for pedestrian and bicycle traffic and to reduce vehicle/pedestrian conflicts throughout the Town. Also, to develop an implementation plan to incorporate a network of on-street bicycle facilities and off-street trails and sidewalks.
- Cities will be solicited again in FY 2012 to participate in this program. MGP Committee will review proposals and make recommendations for award to the TPC for MPO Board's approval.

TASK NUMBER AND TITLE:

4.14 PUBLIC INFORMATION PROGRAM

PURPOSE:

To **inform the citizenry** of Miami-Dade County **about the transportation planning process** and provide an avenue of dialogue for their input in the development of transportation projects and programs within the County. Prepare informational materials and conduct activities to meet MPO public involvement program requirements to include, but not limited to, Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP), Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), and the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP).

PREVIOUS WORK:

The following work was completed for FYs 2009 and 2010:

- Staff attended sixty-eight (68) Outreach Events at such places as: Carnival Cruise Lines; Norwegian Cruise Lines; City of Homestead City Hall; Homestead Air Force Base; Shula's Hotel & Golf Resort; Vitas, Inc.; South Dade Chamber of Commerce; Mid-Town Shops; Beckman Coulter; Homestead Hospital; Northside by USA Flea Market; Jose Marti Park; Fisher Island Resort & Spa; Hialeah High School; William Turner Tech Sr. High School; St. Brendan High School; MDC InterAmerican Campus; 200 SE 1st Street (Lobby); Ryder Headquarters; Hilton Bentley Hotel; Museum Tower; Bayfront Park; Miami Beach Convention Center; Cordis Miami Lakes; Comstack Elementary; Joseph Caleb Center; West Kendall Library; Hotel Sofitel; Jackson Memorial Hospital; Miami Gardens City Hall; Firefighters Memorial Building; World Emblem International; Emmanuel Haitian Baptist Church; Hills Pavilion in Bayfront Park; Recreation Complex Miami Shores Village; Intercontinental Hotel; Marriott Biscayne Bay; Marriott South Beach; Barry University; Mercy Hospital; Miami Dade College; Eden Roc; Viceroy Hotel; Miami International University of Arts and Design; Miami High School; Christopher Columbus High School; Perrine Service Center; and Robert Morgan Education Center.
- Staff disseminated thirty-six (36) Media Advisories/Press Releases and participated in seventy-eight (78) Radio and Television interviews on various topics with outlets such as: Channel 10; NBC-6; Miami Herald; CBS-4; WLRN; Express News; Kendall Gazette; Miami Today News; Diario Las Americas; Miami Monthly Magazine; Channel 23 Mercado de Dinero; Diario Las Americas; WSVN 7; Noticeras 41; TransitMiami.com; South Florida Business Journal; El Nuevo; Haitian American Business News; The Observer Newspaper; Miami Gardens Observer; Highriser Newspaper; Metro Magazine; Miami New Times; Bicycling Magazine; South Miami News; Poder Magazine; Palmetto Bay e-Currents; and American Towns.
- The Miami-Dade County Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) in coordination with Miami-Dade County's Government Information Center (GIC) coordinated the 5th and 6th Annual Public Service Announcement (PSA) Contests among all applicable colleges and High Schools in Miami-Dade County. The purposes of the Contests were to educate students about the role of the MPO and utilize their creativity to educate the community in 30-sec spots. The winners were announced and recognized during the televised May MPO Governing Board meetings in the County Commission Chambers and each PSA was aired for one month on Miami-Dade TV, on local municipal television stations, and on the County's YouTube account. The PSA Contests were held as follows:

- The 5th Annual PSA Contest promoted 'Pedestrian Safety'. High School students responded from Miami Senior High, La Salle High, Robert Morgan High, Felix Varela Senior High, John A. Ferguson Senior High, Miami Sunset Senior High, and Hialeah Miami Lakes Senior High. College students responded from Miami-Dade College. As a result, thirteen students submitted PSAs for the contest. Three student Producers created exceptional PSAs and were chosen as the winners: Samuel Gervais, a sophomore from La Salle High School; Melissa Grafton, a senior from La Salle High School; and Jose Rodriguez, a senior from Miami Senior High School.
- The 6th Annual PSA Contest promoted the 'South Florida Vanpool Program'. High School students responded from John A. Ferguson Senior High School, Immaculate-La Salle High School, William Turner Technical High School, Miami High Senior High, and Hialeah High School. College students responded from Florida International University. As a result, nineteen students submitted PSAs for the contest. Three student Producers created exceptional PSAs and were chosen by the Program Committee as the winners: Melissa Grafton, La Salle High School "Let's Ride"; Karina Rico-Arango, Miami Senior High School "Conversation with Bob"; and Abed Hassan, Hialeah Senior High School "Frustration to Relaxation".
- The MPO Newsletter "Transportation Voice" was produced each year for the Spring, Fall, and Winter in English, Spanish, and Creole. They were also placed on the MPO website and were distributed to approximately 6,000 individuals via the Library system, MPO Governing Board member offices, outreach events, the MPO PIO database members, and the master MPO mailing database. The newsletters were also posted on the website at www.miamidade.gov/mpo in all three languages.
- The Annual (Summer) MPO Newsletter, titled "Transportation for a New Century", is the MPO's annual report to the citizens and is a major component of the MPO's Public Involvement Program. The 2009 and 2010 Annual newsletters featured updates on the MPO's and various transportation agencies' activities as well as information about the services that are being provided by each of them. They were printed in English, Spanish, and Creole, distributed to 700,000 residents through the Miami Herald, el Nuevo Herald, and various community newspaper outlets, and made available on the MPO website.
- Continued work on the Community Characteristics Program (CCP). The following was completed by the Florida International University Geographic Information Systems and Remote Sensing Center (FIU-GISRSC) and Metropolitan Center (FIU-MC):
 - Identify twenty-four (24) neighborhoods at the smaller Neighborhood level for areas within the incorporated areas of Miami-Dade, such as Cutler Bay, Homestead and Florida City. These will include Rockdale, Peters, Bel Aire, Franjo, the Lake District, Airport West and others. Boundaries were determined by semi-structured interviews with members of neighborhood associations, other area institutions, and knowledgeable city planners. Particular attention was paid to historic places, districts, and neighborhood area organizations. City comprehensive plans were reviewed for initiatives concerning neighborhood revitalization.
 - Re-organized and updated all map layers, aerial photos, census data, and MPO reports in a newly constructed Geo-database that runs from an Oracle enterprise data engine. Generated demographic summaries by communities based upon digitized neighborhood and municipality boundaries. Added new tables to hold summarized statistics for all requested variables to the Oracle Geodatabase. Expanded the charting, reporting scripts to the new summary table to allow search by neighborhood directly.
 - Oreated a new interface to allow main components to be reflected in one screen, which can be seen on the left side of the screen. This design differs from the previous interface where multiple screens are involved, which can cause confusion. With the new approach the user will never

have to leave the main screen for retrieval of information, and therefore, will not get lost in navigation. The appropriate tools will only been shown when necessary, otherwise hidden.

- Reviewed demographic categories for all neighborhoods that were evaluated and graded by demographic category. The resulting demographic scores were then be used to prioritize a list of Public Involvement Strategies that apply to this information. Quantitative analysis, including cluster analysis, was used to group neighborhoods among the available categories. Comparisons were made with County average age, education level, ethnic/racial mix, median income, disability percentage, predominant languages spoken, and vehicle ownership. The variance calculated from these comparisons were weighted by its impact on each neighborhood across the seven categories. This resulted in the most important neighborhood factor to satisfy with the application of an appropriate Public Involvement Strategy.
- Re-designed and developed the MPO portal including the following: the Main MPO Portal, Public Involvement Strategies, and Community Background Reports sections. These areas were developed using an updated Content Management System (CMS) that provides greater scalability, user account management, content management, and administration, and analysis features. Additionally, a redesign of the site was completed to match the migration of the MPO Interactive Mapping application, which includes updated graphic elements and new user interface.
- Completed the process of transferring the MPO mapping and reporting tools from the out-of-date ArcIMS platform to the state-of-art ArcGIS Server environment where fast retrieval speed and stable robust performance are achieved.
- Provided presentations to the following six committees:
 - 1. Public Involvement Management Team (PIMT);
 - 2. Regional Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (RTTAC);
 - 3. Citizens Transportation Advisory Committee (CTAC);
 - 4. Transportation Planning Technical Advisory Committee (TPTAC);
 - 5. Transportation Planning Council (TPC); and
 - 6. MPO Governing Board.
- Updated and translated the MPO's Citizens' Guide to Transportation. "On the Move", the Miami-Dade County's Citizens' Guide to Transportation, originally created in 2004, is a pocket-size booklet that provides the following transportation information: Transit services including MDT, Jitneys, South Florida Regional Transportation Authority, Local Circulators, STS, etc.; Highway services including Service patrols, SunGuide, SunPass®, ITS, etc.; Non-motorized transportation including bikes on trains and buses, greenways, etc.; Paratransit and small mass transit services including vanpools, taxis, airport shuttles, carpooling, etc., and the Airport and Port of Miami. All information was updated that had become obsolete and added services that became available since the booklet's inception. To accommodate the Latin and Haitian communities, the updated booklet was translated to Spanish and Creole, respectively. The booklet was also placed on the MPO website in all three languages to be viewed and downloaded for use.
- Held interactive meetings for the Long Range Transportation Plan and Transportation Improvement Program.
- Televised all MPO Governing Board and full Citizen Transportation Advisory Committee (CTAC) meetings.
- Convened the Public Involvement Management Team (PIMT) consisting of the Public Involvement Managers (PIMs) from all local transportation agencies.
- Convened the Regional Public Involvement Managers Team (RPIMT) consisting of the PIMs from the Palm Beach, Broward, and Miami-Dade MPOs.

METHODOLOGY:

Upon the request of the MPO Governing Board or the MPO Staff, the consulting firm or staff engaged in this effort will be asked to conduct any or all of the following relating to either the overall operations and procedures of the MPO, specific MPO policies or topic areas, or individual planning or development projects:

- The development of newsletters, brochures, presentations, or other written products from preexisting MPO technical documents, written or recorded transcripts of meetings, or oral briefings by staff or members of the board. Such work will include preparation of text, preparation of photographic or rendered graphics, layout and supervision of printing for documents featuring up to four-color separation.
- The development of visual presentation materials for meetings or briefings, including display boards, flip charts, overheads, slides, all of which may include charts, spreadsheets, maps, text, or combinations of these. This effort should be prepared to utilize personal-computer based graphics display mediums and to provide the technological means necessary to present such information to individuals or large groups.
- The development of audio and/or video projects, including recording, editing, mastering, and reproduction. Purchase portable TV/DVD combo to use in public settings for video presentations.
- The organization, scheduling, and supervision of meetings and conferences for the general public and specific users, neighborhoods, or professional groups, including room scheduling, preparation of presentations, graphics, publicity, and record keeping, the latter to include audio and/or video recording, if necessary.
- Continue the development of the Integrated Transportation Information System (ITIS), formally known as the Community Characteristics Project (CCP). In 2007 the CCP was adopted regionally by the Broward and Palm Beach MPOs and was renamed to the ITIS. This program is a component of the Sociocultural Effects Program, which is an interactive web-based pubic involvement tool that will enable planners to more effectively target specific groups in the population for outreach. In addition, this tool will be utilized when determining the Sociocultural Effects for the Efficient Transportation Decision Making (ETDM) process. This interactive tool consists of three elements:
 - 1. A Web-based GIS System that will generate customized demographic and project related reports for any area within Miami-Dade;
 - 2. A "How to Reach Out to the Community Guide" that will provide detailed information on the most effective strategies to use on various target populations (including hard-to-reach populations);
 - 3. A Community Background Report, for select communities in Miami-Dade County, that will provide information on the area's history and on any other issue that may affect public involvement efforts in that community.

With this tool, planners will be able to select an area within Miami-Dade County, identify the target population for the area, determine the appropriate public involvement strategy for the target population, and identify any issues that may affect pubic involvement efforts.

- Create Public Service Announcements (PSAs) to be aired on Miami-Dade TV, applicable municipal television stations, and the County's YouTube account.
- Evaluate the effectiveness of the public involvement program by utilizing the established General Outreach Evaluation Form in the PIP.
- Hold an annual interactive TIP meeting to solicit input from the public regarding the plan.

• To collect data as appropriate to prepare responses to questions regarding the annual FDOT/MPO certification process and monitor findings and address outstanding issues to ensure the MPO process is in compliance with all Federal and State guidelines and laws.

All work to be performed under this element shall be approved by the MPO Director. Once a request is made, appropriate coordination shall be established with the MPO, as well as project managers or any other official to develop the requested action. The projects or action requests shall be based on partial work orders. Prices shall be negotiated according to factors such as: amount and complexity of work to be done, quality of the end product, delivery time and number of copies, among other.

END PRODUCTS:

Public Information/Participation end products will be generated according to the type of job requested as shown in the aforementioned methodology and funds may be allocated to complete a requested task following the approval of the committees, MPO Board, Federal agencies and the State. The following are end products for FY 2011-2012:

FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION DISTRICT SIX PLANNING PROGRAM FY 2011

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is a partner in the transportation planning and policy development activities of the Miami-Dade MPO. The transportation planning products and services provided by the District Six Planning and Environmental Management Office fall into the categories described below: MPO coordination and support; growth management reviews; corridor planning and analysis; and transportation statistics.

MPO/Local Government Support: The Planning and Environmental Management Office provides administrative and technical support to the MPO, and to local governments. The District grants approximately \$2.6 million of Federal planning funds annually to the MPO to fund the Unified Planning Work Program. The District also provides technical assistance for the development of the MPO's 20-year Long Range Transportation Plan, and the five-year Transportation Improvement Program. District staff serves on many MPO committees and has non-voting representation on the MPO Board. The District also provides grants to municipalities and other governmental entities for planning studies, and other Federal Highway Administration Discretionary Program grants. The District participates in various local and regional government committees, such as the South Florida Regional Planning Council, the South Florida Regional Transportation Authority's Planning Technical Advisory Committee and the Southeast Florida Transportation Council's Regional Transportation Technical Advisory Committee.

Growth Management Reviews: The District reviews local government comprehensive plans, and developments of regional impact to determine the impacts to the transportation system from these land development activities. These reviews often result in recommendations for new and/or improved transportation facilities and services. Guidelines for this work are found in the State Comprehensive Plan, the Florida Transportation Plan, and various State statutes and rules.

Corridor Planning and Analysis: Corridor planning includes a variety of studies ranging from county-wide systems level studies to detailed operational analysis of specific corridors. Often the corridors selected for study are projects identified in the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP), which have existing or projected deficiencies. Occasionally corridor improvements are studied that may become projects adopted into the LRTP. Methodologies generally include analyzing the existing and future traffic conditions in the corridor, identifying potential environmental, social, and policy barriers, and recommended improvements. Typically they include tasks for public participation. These studies often provide the basis for more detailed project development and environmental studies.

Transportation Statistics: Transportation Statistics collects the highway and traffic data that the Department needs to carry out its responsibilities. It provides data in two important areas. First, there is roadway inventory data, which is documented in the Roadway Characteristics Inventory (RCI), the Straight Line Diagrams (SLDs) and the Video Log Library. The second is the collection and reporting of traffic count data, including vehicle classification, and the development of future traffic projections used in pavement structural design. Statistics also administers the pavement management system, which evaluates the structural integrity of the pavement and develops the list of future resurfacing projects. Finally, Statistics compiles and

updates an extensive list of maps to display the data that is collected, including maintenance of the Geographic Information System.

Prominent Projects: This section provides a listing, with a short description, of some of the more prominent FDOT activities and projects ongoing or anticipated to begin during fiscal year 2011.*

Data Collection/Pavement Management Projects

- Pavement Management Program: This program deals with improvements to the structural condition of existing pavements on the State Highway System. The process ensures that 80 percent of the pavement meets Department standards. Cost estimates also are developed for each new segment to meet financial obligations within the work program and budget.
- **Traffic Data Collection:** This task involves collecting and monitoring vehicle count and vehicle classification inventory data on the State Highway System.
- Roadway Classification Inventory (RCI) and Highway Performance Monitoring System: This task involves data entry and maintenance for reporting roadway information to the FDOT Central Office and the Federal Highway Administration.
- **Permanent Traffic Monitoring Sites (PTMS):** This task involves the conversion of selected sites on the State Highway System from temporary pneumatic hose traffic counters to high-tech PTMS monitoring devices. Once a site is selected, the process includes design and construction of the PTMS count stations.

Planning Projects and Studies

• I-95 (State Road 9A) "95 Express" Project: The Department has implemented the "95 Express" Managed lanes project, in both the northbound and southbound directions, between S.R. 112 and the Golden Glades Interchange. This was accomplished under an Urban Partnership Agreement with the Federal Highway Administration. The "95 Express" project is a joint effort of FDOT's Districts 4 and 6 and ultimately the managed lanes will be extended to I-595. Operation of the managed lanes are detailed in ongoing 95 Express performance reports which are produced monthly. They contain a wealth of information on toll rates, revenue collected, operating speeds, traffic volumes, enforcement and other data. ^{*} Please note that this is not an exhaustive list of all activities to be carried out by the FDOT District 6 Planning and Environmental Management Office, and it does not include projects in production phases of development (such as design and construction). For a complete list of all FDOT projects, in all phases of development, please refer to the MPO's Transportation Improvement Program.

•	State Roadway Projects: This project provides an overview of major State roadway projects, with maps, selected from the five-year FDOT District 6 work program and/or future conceptual projects on state roadways from the Miami-Dade Long Range Transportation Plan. The completed document is distributed to MPO members and elected officials in Miami-Dade County.

Peoples' Transportation Plan Studies

In an effort to prevent duplication, increase coordination and ensure consistency with the Long Range Transportation Plan, the Office of Citizens' Independent Transportation Trust (OCITT) shall provide information to the MPO relating to any municipal transportation planning efforts identified for funding with People's Transportation Plan (PTP) Transit Surtax funds.

2010 STANDARD JOINT CERTIFICATION STATEMENT ON THE METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROCESS

Pursuant to the requirements of 23 U.S.C. 134 (k)(5), 23 CFR 450.334(a), the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) District Six, and the Miami-Dade Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) have performed a review of the certification status of the metropolitan transportation planning process for the Miami-Dade MPO with respect to the requirements of:

- 1. 23 U.S.C. 134 and 49 U.S.C. 5303;
- 2. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended (42 U.S.C. 2000d-1) and 49 C.F.R. Part 21
- 3. 49 U.S.C. 5332 prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, or age in employment or business opportunity;
- Section 1101(b) of SAFETEA-LU (Public Law 109-59) and 49 C.F.R. Part 26 regarding the involvement of disadvantaged business enterprises in USDOT funded projects;
- 5. 23 C.F.R. Part 230 regarding the implementation of an equal employment opportunity program on Federal and Federal-aid highway construction contracts;
- 6. The provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.) and the regulations found in 49 C.F.R. Parts 27, 37, and 38;
- 7. The Older Americans Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. 6101) prohibiting discrimination on the basis of age in programs or activities receiving Federal financial assistance;
- 8. Section 324 of 23 U.S.C. regarding the prohibition of discrimination on the basis of gender; and
- 9. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794) and 49 C.F.R. Part 27 regarding discrimination against individuals with disabilities.

FDOT District Six conducted a standard state certification review of the Miami-Dade MPO in 2009. Pursuant to the MPO Handbook, Chapter 7, Section 7.6.1, the District is allowed to conduct a modified certification review for 2010.

The modified joint certification review package for the Miami-Dade MPO consists of (1) this statement, acknowledging substantial compliance with the above requirements, (2) a report, including findings and recommendations, and (3) a discussion of best practices. The contents of the package have been reviewed by the Miami-Dade MPO and accurately reflect the results of certification review meeting held on February 12, 2010, and subsequent consultations among FDOT and the MPO staff.

Based on a joint review and evaluation, the Florida Department of Transportation, District Six, and the Miami-Dade MPO recommend that the metropolitan transportation planning process for the Miami-Dade MPO be certified.

MIAMI-DADE COUNTY METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION (MPO) FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION - DISTRICT SIX 2010 STANDARD JOINT CERTIFICATION OF THE METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROCESS

In accordance with Chapter 7 of the MPO Management Handbook ("Handbook"), the District and the MPO must jointly certify the metropolitan transportation planning process. The District Six Planning and Environmental Management Office (PLEMO) staff have met with Miami-Dade MPO staff to discuss and develop the 2010 certification statement. The following report is a result of the meeting and a review of the Handbook's Certification Checklist (Section 7.11). In accordance with the Handbook (Section 7.6.1) since the "Standard" review was employed last year, the District and the MPO have conducted a "Modified Review" for this year's report.

This report documents the satisfactory performance of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Process, provides findings and recommendations for those areas in which planning activities should be improved, and identifies areas, in Best Practices, in which the MPO excels.

In accordance with the Modified Review, the primary focus of this year's certification has been on follow-up with the issues and points raised in last year's report. Consistent with the Handbook, during the development of the fiscal years 2011 and 2012 UPWP, the recommendations from this certification will be incorporated into the draft UPWP as applicable.

Prior to the 2008 report, the certification review covered regional planning, i.e. Miami-Dade coordination with the Broward and Palm Beach MPOs, as well as the review specific to Miami-Dade. By agreement of the three MPOs and FDOT Districts Four and Six, beginning in 2008, the Regional Review was removed from the certification statement. The regional review will continue, but outside of the joint certification process.

FINDINGS

ICAR Agreement

One of the areas of concern for the District and FHWA has been MPO compliance with Chapter 339.175 Sections (9) (a) 2 and (9) (a) 3, Florida Statutes, requiring an Intergovernmental Coordination and Review (ICAR) agreement for Operators of Public Transportation Systems. The District submitted a draft ICAR agreement to the South Florida Regional Transportation Authority (SFRTA) and to the MPO in 2007. The MPO attorney identified concerns with the agreement which have not yet been resolved. At the certification review meeting held on April 24, 2009, it was agreed that the Department and the MPO would work together to produce a draft agreement within 180 days of the signing of the Joint Certification Statement. The ICAR agreement would then be sent to the SFRTA and the South Florida Regional Planning Council (SFRPC) for review and approval as these agencies are also parties to the agreement. The legal counsels of the MPO and the FDOT have been working together to resolve the differences identified by the MPO. The last remaining issue is the provision dealing with conflict/dispute resolution.

Title VI and Disadvantaged Business Enterprise

The MPO has been diligent in applying their Title VI procedures and Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) plan. The FDOT Equal Opportunity Office (EEO) requires that MPOs include the EEO's Title VI/Non-Discrimination Policy Statement in all of their contracts. The Miami-Dade MPO has been in compliance with this requirement. The MPO tracks DBE participation by requesting that consultants submit a monthly report. The MPO, in turn, submits DBE payment reports directly to the FDOT EEO.

Right-of-Way (ROW) for Transportation Improvements

The previous certification report discussed the need to obtain sufficient ROW for transportation improvements. The MPO should work together with the Departments of Planning and Zoning and Public Works to take steps towards implementing zoning code changes consistent with the recommendations in the "Miami-Dade County Typical Roadway Sections and Zoned Right-of-way Update Study". As stated last year, the District supports a coordinated effort with the MPO, Miami-Dade Public Works and the Miami-Dade Planning and Zoning Departments, to update the County's zoning code for ROW dedications. The County zoning code update is essential to provide sufficient ROW to successfully implement future transportation improvements.

The Department is aware that the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) and not the MPO Governing Board has jurisdiction over this area. Conveying the recommendations made in the above referenced study to the BCC will require coordinated effort, focusing on the impacts to the County.

FDOT Tentative Work Program

Previously, the MPO expressed concern over the review process for the FDOT Tentative Work Program. The timing of the District's submittal of the draft Tentative Work Program has been a problem for the MPO's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) development schedule. The Department's schedule is governed by the legislative budget approval process which leads to the statewide work program development schedule. The State budget and annual work program development cycle is a dynamic process and expected revenues can change up to the time of adoption by the legislature. The MPO and the Department recognize that each agency must do its best to meet the needs of the other, given that the two development schedules do not always work in perfect synchronization.

The challenges reported last year have continued. The Department has experienced additional revenue reductions, as determined by the Revenue Estimating Conferences (REC). The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), commonly known as the "Stimulus Package", has resulted in a large number of work program and TIP amendments. Despite these challenges, both agencies are working together cooperatively. The District commends the MPO for the ongoing cooperation with the Department to ensure consistency of the work program and the TIP. The two agencies will continue to work together to minimize problems and address challenges that may arise in the future.

Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP)

TRIP was created by the Legislature to provide a mechanism for implementation of regional projects and to improve regional coordination. The regional process includes review and approval of TRIP projects and priority lists by the Southeast Florida Transportation Council (SEFTC). The SEFTC Board, made up of one MPO Board member from each of the three MPO's established the Regional Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (RT-TAC). The RT-TAC is composed of staff from the Miami-Dade, Broward, and Palm Beach MPO's, and FDOT Districts Four and Six. The MPO meets monthly with its regional partners. Due to the statewide revenue reductions, the number of projects funded under the TRIP program has been greatly reduced.

Role of the Transportation Planning Technical Advisory Committee (TPTAC)

The TPTAC is a creation of the Transportation Planning Council (TPC), the advisory body to the MPO Governing Board. The TPTAC functions as the technical committee advising the TPC. At last year's certification review meeting there was discussion about the diminished role of the TPTAC in the technical review of MPO products, and whether there is value in restoring this technical review role. The TPTAC review role has been re-energized over the last year and is operating much more effectively. This item will not be carried forward to next year unless new issues are identified.

General Planning Consultant (GPC) Process

The purpose of Task 3.02 General Planning Consultant Support of the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) is to provide professional planning services to the MPO in conducting the transportation planning process for Miami-Dade. As part of this element, a General Planning Consultant (GPC) contract is in place, where five firms are selected to assist the MPO in this process on as needed basis. The process required an approval of the Scope of Work and budget from the MPO Governing Board and FDOT. One of the benefits of this process is that studies can be completed within one year. During the last three years, 39 studies were completed using the GPC process. Recently, through a coordinated effort between FDOT and the MPO, the approval process has been expedited; this enables the MPO to complete the studies in a shorter period.

Regional Coordination

In the 2007 MPO Federal Certification Report, FHWA and FTA expressed their support of the MPO and FDOT's efforts to promote regional planning and encouraged continued coordination within the tri-county area (Palm Beach, Broward and Miami-Dade Counties). The Miami-Dade MPO and FDOT District 6 have been working together with the other two MPOs and FDOT District 4 to address common issues in the region. As a result, a 2035 Regional Long Range Transportation Plan (RLRTP) has been developed and will be presented to three MPOs for approval. This item will not be carried forward to next year unless new issues are identified.

2007 FEDERAL SITE VISIT

During May 2007, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) conducted their periodic MPO certification site visit in Miami-Dade County. The two agencies issued their 2007 Certification Report in August. The report found that no corrective actions were needed, but a number of recommendations were issued. The District encourages the MPO to continue considering the recommendations of FHWA and FTA, and to incorporate them into ongoing processes, tasks, and responsibilities.

SAFETEA-LU

SAFETEA-LU expired on September 30, 2009, and Congress has not passed a new replacement transportation authorization bill. In order to keep transportation dollars flowing, Congress has approved a series of continuing resolutions which extend SAFETEA-LU and authorizes additional funding. The MPO 2035 LRTP remains subject to the SAFETEA-LU requirements. The MPO adopted the 2035 LRTP on October 29, 2009. During this year's certification review meeting, the MPO explained that the new LRTP incorporates Efficient Transportation Decision Making (ETDM) into the LRTP development process. Additionally, the plan considered freight movements, congestion management, the four "T"s (Tolling, Transit, Telecommuting and Technology), sustainability and climate change, set asides for bicycle and pedestrian travel, transportation improvements resulted from the Congestion Management Process (CMP) and park-&-ride lots.

MPO BEST PRACTICES

The MPO takes pride in the timely completion of quality products, community outreach efforts, crash databases, aesthetic project review and others. In addition, the Miami-Dade MPO has demonstrated strong support for regional goals and initiatives in association with their regional partner agencies.

The MPO works hard to create a positive relationship with the public and with its business partners. They, along with the District, take pride in the many MPO activities, some of which we attach as examples of their "best practices." It bears repeating that the MPO website has been recognized around the country as one of the best governmental websites.

In developing the 2035 LRTP, the MPO has undertaken the following practices:

- Block & Ribbon Exercise: Serves as a forum for education and discussion regarding the
 long range transportation planning process. It allows participants to visualize population
 and employment growth over the next 25 years using blocks, and to apply transportation
 solutions to the growth using ribbons. The exercise both engaged users to participate
 actively and provided them an opportunity to learn about the challenges faced by
 transportation planners.
- Interactive Survey Technology: Utilized the Option Finder Exercise for a real-time assessment of transportation priorities over a series of 12 workshops with the public. The use of Option Finder streamlined the evaluation process with transportation agency representatives. This was achieved by successfully engaging participants, and facilitating

the efficient and accurate collection of public input that helped shape the outcome of the LRTP.

- Interactive LRTP Web Application: The application was developed to provide users with 24-hour access to a variety of information pertaining to the development of the 2035 LRTP. The information included download of materials, staying current with public involvement activities, providing comments and/or suggestions using online applications, and viewing projects in a Google Maps environment.
- Integration of the Freight Plan and Congestion Management Process (CMP) into the 2035 LRTP: Both plans were integrated into the LRTP for the first time to provide for a more meaningful role for both the Freight Plan and CMP in the improvement of the County's transportation network.
- Financial Set-Asides for Congestion Management and Non-Motorized Projects: Financial set-asides for these two programs were established early in the LRTP update process. This ensures a minimum funding commitment to two very important types of transportation improvements, consistent with public input received in development of the plan.
- Regional LRTP Process and the South East Florida Transportation Council (SEFTC): Conducted a regional coordination process for the Southeast Florida region to develop a regional LRTP focused on highway and transit facilities serving regional travel markets.
- Measures of Effectiveness (MOEs): MOEs were developed for each of the 49 objectives in the LRTP Goals and Objectives to assess the plan's performance on a system wide basis.

Following is a list of the MPO's outstanding, and ongoing, efforts that have improved the development of the transportation planning process for the Miami-Dade area:

CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Florida Department of Transportation, District 6, and the Miami-Dade MPO, certify that the Metropolitan Transportation Planning process complies with the requirements of 23 USC 134 and 23 CFR 450.334. Both agencies look forward to working together in the coming year to address the following recommended actions described in this report:

- It is strongly recommended that the legal counsel of the MPO and the FDOT meet to resolve the last remaining issue regarding the provision dealing with conflict/dispute resolution. MPO and FDOT staff should continue to make this item a priority by working closely with both legal counsels to maintain the level of progress achieved on this item in recent months. The ongoing coordination is expected to result in the completion of the ICAR Agreement in the coming months. Once completed, the document will be forwarded to SFRTA and SFRPC for their review and concurrence.
- A study should be conducted, as part of the General Planning Consultant (GPC) Contract
 to evaluate the impacts of providing sufficient Right-of Way (ROW) for transportation
 improvements. Close coordination between FDOT, Public Works Department,
 Department of Planning and Zoning, and the MPO, shall be implemented to present the
 results of this study to BCC for further actions and to update the County zoning code for
 ROW dedication.
- The MPO should continue the regional coordination process through the SEFTC and the RT-TAC to ensure that development of a regional prioritization process and regional performance measures are ongoing activities.

Miami-Dade County MPO 2009 Best Practices and Awards

TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

Interactive Google Maps

This new application resides on the MPO Website and can be accessed to fully display all layers of projects in the TIP. It can be sorted by agency and can be zoomed in and saved in Adobe to create a graphic file that can be emailed.

Citizens TIP Version

A booklet printed in color and illustrated with pictures that highlights TIP projects by agency. It also provides an update on projects completed in the last TIP and those on-going TIP Projects.

TIP Interactive Meeting

The citizen advisory committees of the MPO hosted the televised 10th Annual Interactive TIP event to discuss the MPO's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), which is the five-year program of projects of the 20-year Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). This live, interactive forum provided an opportunity for residents to share their concerns and ideas to help the planning process. All transportation agencies that are a part of the process presented their major investment projects during the event. PSAs from previous contest winners were utilized as commercial breaks as a means to showcase their talents on television.

2035 LONG RANGE TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM (LRTP)

The 2035 LRTP for Miami-Dade County represents an advance in the state of long range transportation planning in the County to a level that innovates and maximizes the benefits of public involvement, optimal financial allocation, and regional coordination, to name a few. A collection of best practices in the transportation planning can be gleaned from this update, including the following:

Visualization Techniques

The use of visualization techniques, required by SAFETEA-LU, is an important method of dissemination of technical transportation information to the public and decision makers. A variety of visualization techniques were developed and utilized in the 2035 LRTP. Some examples of the techniques include the following:

Blocks & Ribbons Exercise

The Blocks & Ribbons exercise includes the use of Legos, ribbon, and base maps, providing a 3-dimensional interactive medium for participants to visualize population and employment growth (Legos) and address the growth with transportation solutions (ribbon). Blocks and Ribbons was utilized for six public workshops and the LRTP Steering Committee's use. The exercise both engaged users to participate actively and provided them an opportunity to learn about the challenges faced by transportation planners.

Interactive Survey Technology

An audience response system called Option Finder provided an interactive survey methodology to gage public sentiment regarding mobility issues and challenges facing Miami-Dade County. This enabled a real-time assessment of the transportation priorities of participants. At each of the twelve workshops with the public, participants were asked a series of questions and, using a digital keypad resembling a television remote, keyed in their respective choices. As soon as the choices were selected, the OptionFinder system displayed a chart depicting participant's responses. The use of Option Finder successfully engaged participants and facilitated the efficient and accurate collection of public input that ultimately helped shape the outcome of the LRTP.

Interactive LRTP Web Application

An interactive LRTP website was developed to provide users with a variety of information pertaining to the development of the 2035 LRTP. Citizens were able to utilize this website to download materials, stay current with public involvement activities, and provide comments and/or suggestions using online applications of surveys administered at public meetings. Another interactive feature of the LRTP website is a project mapping element that can be used

to view projects in a Google Maps environment, which includes aerial photography and other mapping elements. Cost Feasible Plan project can be accessed through a variety of methods, including by proximity to a particular location, in the path of a particular trip, or simply by project type, such as highway or transit projects.

Integration of Freight Plan and Congestion Management Process (CMP) to the 2035 LRTP

Both the Freight Plan and the Congestion Management Process were integrated into the LRTP process for the first time in Miami-Dade County. This integration provides a more meaningful role for both the LRTP and the CMP in the cost efficient improvement of the transportation network in the County at a time when transportation funding projections are more limited than in past plan updates.

Financial Set-Asides for Congestion Management and Non-Motorized Projects

Financial set-asides were established early in the LRTP update process for two programs: Congestion Management and Non-Motorized improvements. The fund set-aside for these programs were subtracted from projected revenue estimates prior to the development of the Cost Feasible Plan, ensuring a minimum funding commitment in the plan to those two programs. This represents a commitment to two very important types of transportation improvements, consistent with public input received in the development of the plan.

Regional LRTP Process and the South East Florida Transportation Council (SEFTC)

A regional coordination process was conducted for the Southeast Florida region to develop a regional LRTP that is focused on highway and transit facilities serving regional travel markets. The 2035 LRTP updates in Southeast Florida marked the first regional coordination throughout the plan update process through the participation of a regional board (SEFTC), two regional committees that report to the SEFTC: the Regional Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (RTTAC) and the RTTAC Modeling Subcommittee.

Measures of Effectiveness (MOEs)

MOEs were developed for each of the 49 objectives in the LRTP Goals and Objectives. The MOEs include both quantitative and qualitative measures, all of which are useful indicators of

the plan's ability to meet the goals established early in the plan update process. The MOEs were utilized to assess plan performance on a system wide basis.

CALL FOR IDEAS

The MPO solicits ideas from stakeholders and the general public to help solve the traffic congestion through a "Call for Ideas" campaign. A "Call for Ideas" brochure is sent to over 2,500 persons on the MPO's database, a Press Release is generated and the brochure is highlighted in the MPO web site. Ideas submitted are shortlisted by a committee made up of 12 voting members, which include the MPO, FDOT (Public Transportation Office), FDOT (Planning and Environmental Management Office, Miami Dade Public Works Department, Dade County Public Schools, Miami Dade Transit, South Florida Regional Transportation Authority, Seaport, Miami-Dade Expressway Authority, Department of Planning and Zoning and the Citizen's Transportation Advisory Committee. Ideas recommended for funding are programmed in the draft Unified Planning Work Program for consideration of award.

MUNICIPAL GRANT PROGRAM

One of the elements in the Unified Planning Work Program titled "Municipal Grant Program" encourages Miami-Dade County Municipalities to participate in a competitive program for the performance of relevant transportation planning studies. Every year the MPO solicits all thirty-four cities to submit transportation planning proposals to compete for \$150,000 funds available. The "Municipal Grant Program" ranks each of the proposals to determine which cities' applications should be recommended for award based on the following project evaluation criteria: Level of Service benefits of the proposed project, Impact of mobility/traffic circulation gains, Intermodal nature of proposal, Support of the approved countywide activities of the Unified Planning Work Program, and Consistency with the applicant's local comprehensive plans. The Municipal Grant Program committee consists of 12 voting members from the following departments: MPO, FDOT (Public Transportation Office), FDOT (Planning and Environmental Management Office, Miami Dade Public Works Department, City of Miami Beach, Miami Dade Transit, City of Miami, City of Hialeah, City of North Miami, Department of Planning and Zoning and the Citizens Transportation Advisory Committee. This program requires a 20% minimum match to ensure a commitment from the cities.

MODELING

The MPO's of Miami-Dade, Broward and Palm Beach working together with the Florida Department of Transportation have developed a regional model that will be used for all transportation and land use concurrency in these counties, going away from the individual county models that were based upon the regional model. The model follows the Florida model standard for using the CUBE Voyager platform. The South Florida model (SERPM) has a time of day component so that it can better model both transit and managed lanes. The State is now following South Florida's lead and developing a time of day component for the other models in the State. The transit portion of the model has been designed to meet all of the latest FTA standards for use with supporting transit New Start applications.

FREIGHT TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

For the last 5 years the Miami-Dade MPO has been operating a Freight Transportation Advisory Committee (FTAC) on a monthly basis. The Committee's function is to advise the MPO Board on freight issues and projects. Each Board member appoints one FTAC member and the Committee is made up of representatives of the freight industry with members representing the following groups: logistics, freight forwarders, importers, perishable distributers, trucking company owners, warehouse owners and managers, seaborne container operators, river terminal operations and tug operators. The Committee works closely with FDOT, MDX, and the Department of Public Works to assure that freight issues are considered during the planning, design, construction and operation of roadway projects. During the last year FTAC worked with the MPO's consultants to complete a countywide Freight Plan and worked with the MPO staff in the development of the required freight element of the 2035 LRTP.

MULTI-LINGUAL ADVERTISEMENTS

The Miami-Dade MPO is sensitive to the diverse communities that make up Miami-Dade County. The MPO public hearing notices are translated to Spanish and Creole are published in four newspapers that target the diverse communities of the County. These papers are selected based on circulation numbers and ability to reach specific target markets, which not only include the general population but the Hispanic, Haitian, and African American communities.

TELEVISED AND WEBCAST MEETINGS

Both the MPO Governing Board and Citizens Transportation Advisory Committee (CTAC) meetings are televised live and rebroadcast through the week thereafter. In addition the MPO Governing board meetings are webcast and archived to be viewed at a later date if desired.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT (PSA) CONTEST

The MPO presented its 6th Annual Public Service Announcement (PSA) Contest among all applicable educational entities in the county. The contest focused on the South Florida Vanpool Program (SFVP), which was conducted in conjunction with the Miami-Dade County Government Information Center (GIC). The objective was to educate commuters who travel to and from work and live in the same area on the benefits of the SFVP. "Vanpooling" is a group of 7 to 15 commuters who voluntarily participate in a ridesharing arrangement that ultimately takes the 'work' out of getting to work. There were 67 student applicants from all over Miami-Dade County, with three producers who were chosen by the judges: Melissa Grafton, La Salle High School "Let's Ride"; Karina Rico-Arango, Miami Senior High School "Conversation with Bob"; and Abed Hassan, Hialeah Senior High School "Frustration to Relaxation". La Salle's Melissa Grafton is the first student to place in the top three for two years in a row, a student from Miami Senior High has placed in the top three for five consecutive years, and this is Hialeah Senior High's first time in the top three. These PSAs are showcased for one month each on Miami-Dade TV, posted on the County's 'On Demand' Web Portal, and aired on 11 municipal TV stations within the County. Winners also receive recognition during the May MPO Governing Board meeting and a letter from the GIC Director recognizing them for outstanding service to local government.

THE INTEGRATED TRANSPORTATION INFORMATION SYSTEM

The Integrated Transportation Information System (ITIS), formally known as the Community Characteristics Program (CCP), is now a regional web-based tool, which enables Transportation Planners and Public Involvement Offices (PIO) to create an effective public involvement (PI) program and accomplish stated Title VI goals that allows the identification of the attitudes and issues facing that particular community. PI strategies are modified according to community characteristics, such as, but not limited to, literacy rates, income levels, cultural composition, and religious affiliation. For example, if an area has a low literacy rate, it would be more

effective to use audio and visual aids rather than to distribute brochures, hand-outs, and other reading materials. By utilizing the ITIS, staff has access to this invaluable information to tailor its outreach approach to determine a community's stand on a project and work with that community to gather support.

COMMUNITY ACTION AGENCY

Staff has begun attending various Miami-Dade County Community Action Agency (CAA) meetings to assist them with their transportation needs. Issues are directed to the appropriate agency for follow-up and possible action. The CAA empowers economically disadvantaged individuals, families, and communities to achieve self-sufficiency through resource mobilization, service delivery, education, and advocacy. The agency changes people's lives, embodies the spirit of hope, improves communities, and makes America a better place to live. They care about the entire community, and are dedicated to helping people help themselves and each other.

2009 OFFICIAL DESIGNATED PLANNING AGENCY OF THE YEAR

Staff accepted this prestigious award Wednesday, August 19, 2009 at the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantage's (CTD) 17th Annual Transportation Disadvantaged Training and Technology Awards Banquet in Orlando, FL. The MPO was nominated by the Miami-Dade Local Coordinating Board (LCB) who represents various transportation disadvantaged stakeholders specifically the elderly and people with disabilities. The MPO was recognized for its long-standing record of participating and promoting public outreach events with one goal in mind: being available to the public. These events range from school career fairs, community resource fairs, health fairs, as well as visiting staff at private businesses and public agencies where pertinent information is distributed and ideas are received regarding the improvements of transportation facilities and services. The MPO was also praised for facilitating public meetings, many of which are televised on Miami-Dade TV, as well as maintaining an award-winning web portal. Staff acknowledged this multi-pronged outreach approach is designed to allow citizens access to important transportation issues through as many avenues as possible.

SAFETEA-LU Eight Planning Factors

The Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) slightly modified the planning factors that are to be considered in the MPO planning process, of which the LRTP is a part. These planning factors are found in 23 U.S.C. 134(h)(1) and in Subsection 339.175(5)(b). They include:

- (1) support the economic vitality of the metropolitan area, especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency;
- (2) increase the safety of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users;
- (3) increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users;
- (4) increase the accessibility and mobility of people and for freight;
- (5) protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns;
- (6) enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system across and between modes for people and freight;
- (7) promote efficient system management and operations; and
- (8) emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system

APPENDIX A

During the performance of this contract, the contractor, for itself, its assignees and successors in interest (hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor") agrees as follows:

- (1.)Compliance with Regulations: The Contractor shall comply with the Regulations relative to nondiscrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the U.S. Department of Transportation (hereinafter, "USDOT") Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21, as they may be amended from time to time, (hereinafter referred to as the Regulations), which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this Agreement.
- (2.) Nondiscrimination: The Contractor, with regard to the work performed during the contract, shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, religion or family status in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. The Contractor shall not participate either directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by section 21.5 of the Regulations, including employment practices when the contract covers a program set forth in Appendix B of the Regulations.
- (3.) Solicitations for Subcontractors, including Procurements of Materials and Equipment: In all solicitations made by the Contractor, either by competitive bidding or negotiation for work to be performed under a subcontract, including procurements of materials or leases of equipment; each potential subcontractor or supplier shall be notified by the Contractor of the Contractor's obligations under this contract and the Regulations relative to nondiscrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, religion or family status.
- (4.)Information and Reports: The Contractor shall provide all information and reports required by the Regulations or directives issued pursuant thereto, and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the Florida Department of Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, and/or the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such Regulations, orders and instructions. Where any information required of a Contractor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information the Contractor shall so certify to the Florida Department of Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, and/or the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.

- (5.) Sanctions for Noncompliance: In the event of the Contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this contract, the Florida Department of Transportation shall impose such contract sanctions as it or the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, and/or the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
 - a. withholding of payments to the Contractor under the contract until the Contractor complies, and/or
 - b. cancellation, termination or suspension of the contract, in whole or in part.
- (6.)Incorporation of Provisions: The Contractor shall include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (6) in every subcontract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto. The Contractor shall take such action with respect to any subcontract or procurement as the Florida Department of Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration, Federal Transit Administration, Federal Aviation Administration, and/or the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance. In the event a Contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a sub-contractor or supplier as a result of such direction, the Contractor may request the Florida Department of Transportation to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the Florida Department of Transportation, and, in addition, the Contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

General Comments

- The Miami MPO is commended for a thorough UPWP.
 - o Response: Thank you.
- For the Final UPWP, the MPO should consult the latest funding tables from the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to verify the total PL fund projection is equal or less than the estimated available funding for the subject MPO area.
 - o Response: Numbers verified.
- All Agreements or Certifications, including Debarment and Suspension, Contracts, Grants, and Cooperative Agreements, Title VI agreements and DBE statements should be signed and dated, and included in the final document.
 - o Response: Upon MPO Board adoption and review for legal sufficiency, referenced documents will be signed accordingly.
- Please provide a section in the Final UPWP to show how the MPO addressed the FHWA's comments on the draft. This may be included in the Appendix.
 - o Response: This file will be included in the Appendix section.
- If FDOT district planning activities are included in each MPO's UPWP, FTA funding should be identified; hopefully, the state activities for transit efforts are funded through state program funds 5313(b) rather than MPO planning funds 5303. If district funds are captured in appendices, why are MPOAC funds not captured?
 - o Response: The District does not use any FTA Section 5303 funding for planning purposes, nor have they received any Section 5313 funds to support District planning purposes. MPOAC funds will also be included in a separate file under the Appendix section immediately following the district planning activities.
- Federal agencies should not be asked to review incomplete documents-appendices are included with annotations that the information will be incorporated later.
 - o Response: In order to meet the deadline, the MPO had to forward draft document with two pending outdated files. One of which, District Planning Activities has been updated and incorporated into this final draft. We are anticipating to have the Joint Certification included in the adopted version.
- The UPWP did not reflect Climate Change. It is suggested that the MPO consider undertaking efforts toward ensuring sustainability of transportation systems in light of intensifying climactic conditions including but not limited to severe weather patterns and rising sea levels.
 - o Response: Text added to tasks 1.02 and 3.01 to address concern.
- For the upcoming years, FTA will be looking for MPO planning to support grantees' National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) documentation with special emphasis on cumulative effects. Miami-Dade MPO's significant work on Strategies for Integration of Sustainability and the Transportation System is noted with pleasure.
 - o Response: Duly noted.

Task Specific Comments

- Cover Page: The MPO website address in missing from the cover. UPWP format is referenced in the MPO Handbook.
 - o Response: Address text box will be expanded to include website address.

- Page D-26, Task 4.11: Equipment purchases are included in the task description.
 Also, please refer to the subject OMB A-27 circular for additional guidance for eligibility and preapproval requirements.
 - o Response: Prior to equipment purchase, OMB A-27 will be referenced to ensure all requirements are met.

Federal Transit Administration Comments

- Task 1.07 Evaluation of current Methodology to Determine Traffic Concurrency appears abbreviated; more thorough explication would improve this element.
 - o Response: A much more detailed scope will be provided at time of 3rd party approval to FDOT and FHWA.
- Regarding General Planning Consultant Support, kindly consider that FTA is more interested in the actual deliverable than in the contractual mechanism (such as requirements/task order contract or blanket service contract); when discreet studies are undertaken over multiple years, whether through consultants or I-H, FTA is looking for both schedules that show how long each effort has taken and how much cumulative cost has gone toward each effort. No specific I-H studies are indicated, suggesting the preponderance of discreet studies will be accomplished by consultant forces-this means that information on time and cost of multi-year studies is more difficult to track, but should be accurately reported in the UPWPs.
 - o Response: The purpose of this task is to have funds available for "on-demand" types of studies not known at time of preparation of UPWP as ultimately approved by the MPO Board. Requests for these studies may originate from FDOT, MPO Board Members, municipalities, Transportation Planning Council, and transportation agencies, such as MDX, Tri-Rail, MDT, Public Works, etc. There are no discreet work efforts, all studies to be conducted are forwarded to the District and FHWA for approval prior to submissions of Notice-to-Proceed to consultant. Having a pool of consultants under contract saves months of procurement time and thousands of dollars as shown under Previous Work of said task 3.02.
- General: Please consider the practicality of including names (rather than offices) of specific project managers in the UPWP, since personnel turn-over is to be expected. Technically, as written any change in personnel renders the UPWP is out-of-date. Kindly weigh this against the advantage of having project managers identified in the document.
 - o Response: The UPWP is a working document used not only in-house but by many local agencies and other transportation planning partners in the region. The project manager's name gives the reader a direct contact person to reach. Should that person leave the MPO, his or her assignments are given to the next employee. Fortunately, the Miami-Dade MPO has a very low attrition rate. In addition, in the Participating Agencies section, the primary agency is identified.
- Pursuant to Task 4.05 Citizen and Private Sector Involvement, it is interesting that instead of the usual Public Involvement section, Miami-Dade has elected to combine general public engagement efforts with business community/private sector investor community input suggesting public private partnership potential. I look forward to

monitoring how the MPO and its subsidiary FTA grantees balance social and economic interests and competing values throughout administration of the Public Involvement Plan. The methodology section could be improved by adding an element for evaluation of adequacy of the activities, opportunities and techniques used to engage the general public as well as private sector participants.

- o This task relates only to the administration of the CTAC and TARC, not how we are engaging the private sector per se. Engaging of the private and public sectors is discussed under Task 4.14. To clarify, this task was renamed to 'Citizen Transportation Committees' and text was added to the Purpose section to distinguish the 2 other more specific citizen committees, BPAC and FTAC.
- Pursuant to Task 4.14 Public Information Program, suggest development of
 qualitative and/or quantitative methodologies for determining the best activities,
 opportunities and techniques for engaging the public and eliciting authentic feedback.
 As written, the task could easily slip into "cookbook" patterns. Kindly note that
 annotation of numbers of activities/meetings alone is inappropriate for gauging
 effectiveness.
 - Response: Due to the complex nature of evaluating public involvement strategies in our arena, the FDOT, under FHWA, has been working to develop a standard qualitative evaluation methodology with performance standards for all MPOs to adopt. We have engaged in their studies, on numerous occasions, and are awaiting their final direction on this issue. As such we have adopted our current quantitative evaluation methodology to at least be able to gauge our current activities.
